An Easter Sunrise Service for Individuals & Families • April 12, 2020

No gathered choirs are singing; no banners lead the way. O God of love and promise, where's joy this Easter Day? With sanctuaries empty, may homes become the place we ponder resurrection and celebrate your grace."

"This Easter celebration is not like ones we've known." So many things are different from Easters past, and it is very easy to spend our time focused on what is missing from our celebration this day instead of embracing the gifts an Easter like this brings. One such gift is the opportunity to embrace the stillness, the intimacy of that moment when Mary met the risen Jesus in the garden that first Easter morning, or to try and imagine what the disciples who rushed to the tomb must have been thinking when they thought somebody had stolen the body only to discover later that wasn't the case at all.

We can be distracted by our Easter worship trappings, beautiful as they may be, and forget to stop and reflect on what it means to us personally and to the community God is calling us to serve, that "for our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again..." So this year, you are invited to experience Easter in a different, quieter, way.

For the service, all you need is yourself and this document. The service can be easily done in your living room or around the kitchen table. If circumstances allow, consider getting up before sunrise (6:38AM in Richmond) and going outside for the service to pay attention as night turns to twilight turns to daylight. If you have a fire pit, you are welcome to light a bonfire. There is an instruction at the start of the service to light a candle if you have one available to represent the Christ candle.

You can read the scripture passage from your own Bible, though the text is inleuded for your convenience. The service includes a hymn that you may wish to sing or hum as you read the lyrics, or simply read the text as a prayer. If you are doing the service with others, take turns reading aloud; some parts have been put in bold to help facilitate alternating readers, though you are welcome to break it up (or not) anyway you wish. And even if you are doing the service by yourself, consider speaking parts of the service out loud, perhaps the prayers.

In all of it, do what feels right to you in the moment; there is no right or wrong way to use this resource.


Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

O risen Christ, open us to the power of your resurrection as we hear it proclaimed anew this day, that we too might rise to new life in you. Amen.

SCRIPTURE John 20:1-18

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went toward the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she

said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

SILENT REFLECTION

Spend some time reflecting on the text and that first Easter morning. Some prompts if helpful:

- What might have been your response had you been there?
- Are there moments or words in the story that stand out? Why do they resonate?
- How does this story speak to you this day in our present circumstances?
- What will you carry with you in hope and comfort for the days ahead?

You may use this time to simply rest in God's presence, listening for what God is saying to you in this moment.

PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

Lord of life, hear us as we lift to you our hopes and prayers for the church and the world.

You are invited to offer your prayers either silently or aloud as the Spirit leads.

On this day, O God, Christ's resurrection gives us hope that nothing—no tragedy, no mistake, no sin, no evil—is beyond the redemptive power of your love. This is the truth of your kingdom, a kingdom we long for, a kingdom for which we now pray using the words the living Christ teaches us:

THE LORD'S PRAYER

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory, forever. Amen.

BENEDICTION

Go forth in joy.

You have God's kingdom in your heart.

Go forth in love.

Live for the Lord.

Go with hope and forgiveness.

The grace of God sustains.

Go forth in peace. Go forth in light.

Amen.

Alleluia!
